## Bear Smart Guide for Campers

- Do not leave coolers, food, garbage, recycling, dirty dishes or portable bbq's unattended at your campsite.
- Take all garbage and recycling to the bear-proof containers provided as soon as possible.
- It's always best to store food in "certified" bear-resistant containers or, as a last resort store in your vehicle with the windows rolled up.
- Never keep food in tents. Even some toiletries are attractive to bears particularly those with a strong odour
  and may lure bears inside your tent.
- Don't use any products containing citronella, especially candles or insect repellent - bears love citronella!
- Keep your fire pit clean and free of food residue. If food scraps aren't burned completely, scoop them out and deposit them in a bear-proof garbage container.
